

Bohloko ba ho timellwa ke Motswadi bo tswala Setaki sa ditshwantsho

Thabang Dlamini o ne a le ka tlase ho dilemo tse tsheletseng ha a timellwa ke Mme motswadi. Ho lokolla bohloko le kgalefo, Thabang o ile a balehela botaking ba ditshwantsho. “Botaki ba ditshwantsho e ne e se ntho eo ke e ratang ho tloha bonyaneng ba ka, ekasitana le ho nahana hore nka iphumana ke sebetsana le yona kamoso. E bile ketsahalo e bohloko ya ho arohanywa ke lefu le Mme wa ka e ileng ya etsa hore ke iphumane ke le motaki kajeno,” ho boletse Dlamini, ya tsejwang ka la (Thabang Dlamini sir za) mosebetsing wa hae wa ho taka.



“E ne e re ha ke hopotse Mme e be ke qalella ka ho taka, le ha ke ne ke sa tsebe le hantle seo ke neng ke se taka empa ke ile ka fumana hore nako le nako ha ntse ke etsa jwalo maikutlo a bohloko bo kahare ho nna le kgalefo ya ho hloka mme di ne di thobeha,” ho rialo Thabang Dlamini.

Ho ba a tlohe motseng wa Petsana Reitz, Thabang o lebile motseng wa Zamdela Sasolburg ho ya ntshetsa dithuto tsa hae tsa boemo bo tlase(primary) le tsa boemong bo hodimo(secondary) pele. Ke moo a ileng a kopana le baithuti le batho ba bang ba ratang tako ya ditswantsho haholo. Seo se ile sa boela sa tsoselletsa tlhase le lerato kahare ho yena ba botaki mme a ikemisetsa haholo mosebetsing oo.

“Re ile ra kenela ditlhodisano tse fapaneng ho tsa botaki tse kenyeleditseng Sasol Technox, mme ke moo ke eelletseng ka botlalo kamora tshebetse e ntle moo le ho fumana dikgothatso ka mosebetsi wa ka hore botaki bona e ne e hlile e le mpho e patehileng kahare honna”. Ho ba a phethele sehlopha sa leshome, Thabang o ile Vaal University of Technology ho ntshetsa thuto tsa hae pele, mme o ile a thaba haholo ha a utlwa hore univesiti eo e na le dithuto tsa botaki ho yona. Kamora ho sebetsa ka makgethe dilemong tse pedi tsa pele Thabang Dlamini o ile a phethela dithuto tsa hae tsa botaki semmuso univesiting eo ka 2021. Jwaloka ka motaki ya phethahetseng jwale Thabang o sebeletsa sebakeng sa hae Johannesburg Gauteng, moo a etsang botaki ba hae teng, o boetse o sebetsa mmoho le Fourway Gallery ho bapatsa, le ho rekisa ditswantsho tsa hae tsa botaki.

“Ho boima haholo lefapheng lena la tsa botaki, haholoholo ha o le motaki ya motjha ya sa tsejwang hobane o tlameha ho sebetsa ka thata le ka mamello e kgolo ho ikahela lebitso, o tlameha ho tseba hantle seo o se etsang le ho ba le boitsebo boo e leng ba ha obo sa tshwaneng le ba ditaki tse ding. Ditaki ka ho fanana ha tsona di sebedisa mekgwa le tsela tse ngata tse fapaneng ho taka, nna ke sebedisa haholo tseo ke ithutileng le ho di bona kgolong ya ka botaking bona baka, le ho sebetsa mmoho kapa ho batla dikeletso ho ditaki tse ding tse jwaloka Ennock Mlangeni. Ho ya ka nna ke molaetsa o moholo oo nka e fetisang ho ditaki tsa ka moso hore di tsebo seo ba batlang ho se etsa ba fumane le tse tla ba kgothatsa tsatsi ka leng ho etsa mosebetsi wa bona wa botaki. “Maikemisetsa a ka ke ho ba le laeaborari eo e leng yaka moo le nna ke tla fumana monyetla wa ho thusa ditaki tse ntjha le tse tlang di hola le ho ithuta hore le bona ba ntshetse mosebetsi ona wa botaki pele ka ho re bolella ka tsa maphelo le maeto a bona bophelong ba sebedisa botaki”.

SASSA advises beneficiaries to keep verifying contact details to avoid scammers

The South African Social Security Agency (SASSA) in Mpumalanga is advising R350 Social Relief of Distress (SRD) grant beneficiaries to keep on verifying their contact details, to ensure that they are still correct to avoid scammers.

The agency issued the statement after its Customer Care Unit received numerous calls from beneficiaries, complaining that their contacts have been changed.

“Beneficiaries must note that there is a circulating WhatsApp message where scammers are offering to assist applicants to do their applications. By surrendering personal details to the strangers they are able to change the contact details on behalf of applicant.

“The agency is warning R350 grant beneficiaries to do application themselves or request a person that they trust and have access to see or visit them,” SASSA said.

It reiterated that SASSA official customer care cannot change beneficiary contact details without their request.

“The process of changing contact details requires the Identity number of the beneficiary and after that the beneficiary receives OTP number in the cell phone. The official will request the OTP that will enable him or her to update contact details,” the agency said.

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Government commemorates Black Wednesday

Government has joined the South African media industry in commemorating the 45th anniversary of Black Wednesday, also marked as National Press Freedom Day.

This day serves as a reminder of how far the South African media has come and affords the country an opportunity to reflect on media freedom.

On this day in 1977, the apartheid government banned independent media in an attempt to silence the media from reporting about the brutal acts of the apartheid regime. Journalists, which include the then editor of The World, Percy Qoboza were taken into detention.

“A free media is an integral part of our democracy and government is committed to press freedom. We value our regular interactions with the media formations such

as SANEF, the Press Club and the Press Gallery. “We will continue to further strengthen our relations and cement the importance of independence of the media. The freedom of the press must be respected because any threat to the freedom of the media undermines our democracy,” Minister in the Presidency, Mondli Gungubele said.

Gungubele said the right to press freedom and freedom of expression is an important cornerstone of democracy.

He highlighted that the Constitution entrenches the right to freedom of expression, including media freedom because it recognises that the media plays a crucial role in ensuring that all South Africans and government are held to account.

Government, he said, urges the media to continue to uphold the standards of ethical reporting. “We recognise the media as partners in strengthening our democracy and promoting our rights, which many have fought and died for during the years of struggle. We embrace any platform that allows us to strengthen relationships with the media, while also allowing us to speak about the work of government and to share our successes and challenges,” Gungubele said. The Minister added that government appreciates the good work of the media, especially the diligent work that journalists did during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Government also remembers the brave journalists who lost their lives whilst bringing reliable information to our homes.

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
